## Academic Program Overview

The Future Changemakers Program introduces middle school students to the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the policy frameworks behind them. Students examine how the UN addresses global challenges and assess real-world progress toward sustainability through guided research, simulations, UN-style negotiations, and collaborative problem-solving. Building on this foundation, students work in teams to design SDG 18, proposing an original goal that responds to emerging global issues beyond the 2030 agenda. The program culminates in a Global Summit where students present their proposals, developing skills in critical thinking, public speaking, and civic leadership while gaining exposure to careers in diplomacy, international relations, public policy, environmental science, and nonprofit work.



## Excursions

Students may visit key organizations such as the U.S. Institute of Peace, World Bank or local environmental and nonprofit groups to explore diplomacy and sustainable development in practice. Excursions offer firsthand insight into global collaboration and positive impact-driven careers.

## Instructors

Courses are led by accomplished and passionate faculty and practitioners in international relations, political science, and sustainability. Each instructor is selected for their expertise in global studies and their ability to engage middle school students through experiential learning, discussion and real-world simulation.

## Academic Program Overview

The NYU commuter-only program introduces middle school students to the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the policy frameworks behind them. Students examine how the UN addresses global challenges and assess real-world progress toward sustainability through guided research, simulations, UN-style negotiations, and collaborative problem-solving. Building on this foundation, students work in teams to design SDG 18, proposing an original goal that responds to emerging global issues beyond the 2030 agenda. The program culminates in a Global Summit where students present their proposals, developing skills in critical thinking, public speaking, and civic leadership while gaining exposure to careers in diplomacy, international relations, public policy, environmental science, and nonprofit work. Students investigate real-world progress on the SDGs, tackle global issues and work in teams to design an original SDG for the world beyond 2030. The program culminates in a Global Summit, where students present their proposals and reflect on their role as young changemakers.

Students will engage with sustainability experts and visit key local organizations working in diplomacy, international relations, environmental science, policy and nonprofit leadership.
