2-Week Course

This is a two-week program where you'll focus on one course for the entire duration.



Academic Program Overview

This course offers a deep dive into the fundamental principles and theories that underpin economic systems worldwide. Students explore a wide range of topics, including scarcity, opportunity cost, supply and demand, and the role of incentives in decision-making, as well as consumer behavior. Students will also explore market dynamics, gain a better understanding of how prices are determined, and dip their toes in global trade, exchange rates, and discuss economic development. Overall this course provides students with a comprehensive understanding of how economic systems function, equipping them with valuable skills and knowledge to analyze and contribute to economic decision-making at both individual and societal levels. It is a versatile field that can be applied to various industries, including finance, public policy, business, and academia.



Excursions

Students have the opportunity to welcome distinguished speakers, take part in interactive seminars and enjoy a variety of walking tours and excursions around the area focused on economics.

In Berkeley, students have had the opportunity to visit and meet the leadership team at Founders, Inc., a San Francisco-based community, fund, and startup studio that supports founders building emerging technology companies. Students also had the opportunity to engage with a panel of two employee resource groups and toured the VISA headquarters.

Program Highlights

- Learn about fundamental economic concepts such as micro and macroeconomics, historical trends, human behavior, supply and demand, market forces, and pricing.
- Apply economic theories to real-world scenarios and analyze how economic principles impact various sectors of society, such as labor markets, the environment, and international trade.
- Enhance skills in interpreting statistical information and using quantitative tools to make informed decisions
- Gain a better understanding of economic growth, inflation, and GDP, as well as debate on policy conflicts and fiscal policies.
- Examine the benefits of trade activity and globalization.

Academic Program Overview

Economics is a versatile field with applications in finance, public policy, business and academia.



Excursions

Students in the Economics course at Oxford have taken part in an immersive economics walking tour of London led by Dr. Ramin Nassehi, exploring the city's economic history and landmarks while gaining insights into how economic principles shape urban development. The tour also includes a visit to University College London, giving students exposure to the UK's university system and potential academic pathways.

In addition, students attend guest lectures and workshops featuring industry professionals who present case studies from both the public and private sectors. These sessions are followed by career panels where students learn about opportunities in economics and related fields.

Oxford - Paula Bejarano Carbo, MPhil, Economics

Paula is a PhD candidate at the Department of Economics at the University of Oxford. Her research focuses on central bank and government responses to economic shocks. Before starting her PhD, Paula worked as an Economist at the National Institute of Economic and Social Research in London, where she focused on UK macroeconomic policy analysis and forecasting the UK economy. Paula also holds a master's degree (MPhil) in Economics from the University of Oxford and a bachelor's degree (BSc) in Politics, Philosophy and Economics from the University of Warwick.
