Academic Program Overview

Are you considering a career in architecture or design? Are you working on your college application and portfolio? Or are you simply curious about what it is like to be an architect? The Summer Springboard architecture course for high school students introduces architectural ideas, design principles, and methods of exploring problems of the built environment in a collaborative studio setting. While working on a design project you will learn about the academic path to an architectural degree, the day-to-day work of an architect, and the career opportunities.



Excursions

Barnard College/Columbia University

Discover architectural brilliance through exciting excursions! Over the past three summers, students have explored renowned firms like Obra Architects, celebrated for innovative designs. They've journeyed to KPF Architects, creators of towering landmarks like The Edge. At Transsolar, students witnessed the fusion of sustainability and architecture, transforming how we interact with the environment. Finally, they've uncovered the secrets behind Bone-Levine's iconic structures.

Berkeley

At Berkeley, students will have the opportunity to visit some of San Francisco's top architectural firms such as: Siegel & Strain Architects, Aidlin Darling Design, and Feldman Architecture. Students have also had the opportunity to explore the concept of mimetic design with a culminating final project that is set in the natural beauty of Inspiration Point in the Tilden Regional Park.

Instructors

Barnard/Columbia S1 – Dr. Guido Zuliani

Guido Zuliani is an architect and an educator. He graduated from the Università IUAV di Venezia in 1980. Some of Guido's accomplishments include a commission for the design of the New Railway Station of Pompei-Santuario in Pompei (2007); a prize-winning project for New Typologies of Social Housing for the city of Mestre (2009); and a 150,000 sq. ft. residential building in Milan, featured in the architectural guides Milan Architecture 1945-2015 (2015) and Milan Architecture: The City and Expo (2016).

Barnard/Columbia S2 – Emma Sumrow

Emma Sumrow is an architectural designer, researcher, artist, and educator whose work examines the intersections of indigeneity, climate, psychology, boundaries, technology, and policy. Based in New York and originally from Texas, she teaches at Columbia University's Graduate School of Architecture, Planning, and Preservation, and she also serves as an Instructor at the Hillier College of Architecture and Design at the New Jersey Institute of Technology.

Berkeley - Dave Kesler, AIA

Dave is the principal of Dave Kesler Architecture and an award-winning San Francisco-based architect with over 30 years of experience and in private practice for 22 years. He is also an experienced industrial designer, watercolorist, and musician. His firm has designed over 200 projects ranging from high-end residential and multi-family housing, to commercial and institutional work. Dave's work has been published internationally and exhibited in the permanent collections of major museums.

Course Structure

There are nine 3-hour class sessions over the two-week course. During week one, students have class from 9am-12pm, Monday - Friday. During week two students have class from 9am-12pm Monday through Thursday. Wednesday afternoons are dedicated to additional academic time (excursions, speakers).
