Academic Program Overview

The government today can affect all aspects of our lives. Curious to find out more about issues addressed by public policy such as public health, criminal justice, gun rights, immigration, reproductive rights, drug use, education, and disaster preparedness? Learn and discuss the system of laws, regulatory measures, courses of action, and funding priorities concerning a given topic promulgated by a governmental entity or its representatives. This course aims to create conditions for learning, opportunity and experience, which enable young people to develop knowledge and new skills.



Excursions

Previous Public Policy excursions included a city tour of Durham and a visit to the North Carolina State Legislative Building. During the city tour of Durham, Dr. Romine led students to look at the impact of certain policies with regards to housing, transportation, and contemporary home values. Students enjoyed applying their coursework in a hands-on activity with the knowledge of their instructor. Students had the opportunity to observe a house session at the legislative building, witnessing how policies and initiatives are talked about in day to day politics.
